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Funding Opportunities for Community Projects

Gloucestershire Funders

Purpose: Gloucestershire Funders is a collaboration between seven charitable foundations and organisations that can provide funding for charities, groups, people and activities in Gloucestershire. The Gloucestershire Funders are:

- Active Gloucestershire
- Barnwood Trust
- Create Gloucestershire
- Gloucestershire Community Foundation ☐ National Benevolent Charity
- Police and Crime Commissioner's Office
- Thirty Percy Foundation

We are in close contact with the VCS Alliance, the Local Enterprise Partnership and the District and County Councils as well as other charitable funders in Gloucestershire, including Ernest Cook Trust, Ethical Giving, National Lottery, Pied Piper Trust, St James's Place Foundation, Summerfield Trust, The Henry Smith Charity County Grants and The Honourable Company of Gloucestershire.

Who can apply: organisations working with people at particular risk during coronavirus.

Funding:

- Revenue funds for civil society organisations whose immediate survival is at risk, to ensure that they can continue to provide their existing services
- Revenue funds for charities who want to re-imagine and reconfigure their services in light of the new environment they are operating in and the challenges facing the people they exist to serve
- Capital funds for charities already developing spaces and places which will be of benefit to people in the post-pandemic recovery period, where those places or spaces are now at risk

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Gloucestershire Community Foundation

Purpose: Gloucestershire Community Foundation aims to help local groups, organisations and charities to address disadvantage and deprivation in Gloucestershire. The Foundation runs its own grants programme and manages grant programmes on behalf of donors. Priority is given to projects which:

- Reflect the needs and concerns of their beneficiaries by adding value to existing community provision
- Enable people to take up opportunities that would otherwise not be available to them
- Encourage local volunteers to engage with their communities.

Who can apply: Groups and organisations in Gloucestershire working to benefit local communities and to improve the lives of disadvantaged people in the county.

Funding: From £250 to £10,000 depending on the programme.

Deadlines:

- Main grant programme: 23rd September 2022
- High Sheriff of Gloucestershire grant programme: 9th September 2022
- Freemasons grant programme: 30th June 2022

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GCC Build Back Better Councillor Scheme

Purpose: The Build Back Better Fund is designed to support the community to recover from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic which means the county council will be as flexible as possible in the projects it will fund. The fund will be a rolling programme over a 4 year period of 2021-2025.

Recognising the diverse nature and needs of Gloucestershire's communities and neighbourhoods, criteria for bids is likely to consist of key themes including 'community health and wellbeing', 'digital inclusion', 'nature and/or the environment', 'healthy lifestyles' and 'safer neighbourhoods'.

"With further details on the fund set to be released in the coming weeks, I would encourage communities to start thinking about how a share of this fund could be used in their local area."

Who can apply: A range of groups and bodies will be able to submit bids including but not exclusively; community and voluntary organisations, charities, community interest companies, town and parish councils, sports groups.

Funding: up to £40,000 available under each county councillor.

Deadline: Applications will be accepted from 30th July 2021 until 31st January 2025.

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Community Ownership Fund

Purpose: The UK government has launched a new £150 million Community Ownership Fund to help communities across the UK take ownership of local facilities, community assets and amenities such as at-risk local pubs, theatres, post offices, sports grounds, parks and corner shops, etc. The move is part of the UK Government's strategy to build back better from the pandemic and to foster a sense of community. The priorities for the first round are to invest in projects which are ready to access capital funding and complete their projects within 6 months and will be most suitable for community groups who have done preliminary work and have a viable business plan to take ownership of the local asset or amenity at risk.

Who can apply: Communities.

Funding: Matched capital grants of up to £250,000 will be available for most projects. In exceptional cases, up to £1 million matched capital grants will be available to help establish a community-owned sports club or help buy a sports club or sporting facilities at risk of being lost.

Deadline: The second funding round will open in spring 2022.

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Grocers' Charity

Purpose: The Grocers Charity is grant making charity giving grants to small and medium sized organisations in the UK. Its mission is to invest in and support a broad range of UK registered charities which together make a demonstrable positive impact on public benefit.

Who can apply: Registered charities.

Funding: Up to £5,000.

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Isla Foundation - Immediate Impact Grant

Purpose: The Isla Foundation focuses on serving grassroots organisations and individuals that provide vital help to the most vulnerable in society. They can cover a wide range of projects aimed at creating positive changes in people's lives and in their communities. Examples of projects include (but are not limited to) improving community spaces, encouraging social cohesion through sport, art, community activities, or promoting education, the environment or health in the local community. Grants can also be used to test an idea through a pilot.

Who can apply: entrepreneurial individuals, voluntary/community organisations, schools/PTAs, clubs and societies.

Funding: Up to £2,000.

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Let's Be Clear Fund

Purpose: Let's Be Clear is a campaign for clear face masks and clearer communication across Gloucestershire. Let's Be Clear is led by the Barnwood Trust and supported by organisations from across the county

Gloucestershire VCS organisations can apply for funding for any immediate communication need that supports people in the county during this time. It can be used to keep people informed, involved and supported, via the following:

- Clear face masks for staff and volunteers
- Costs to translate materials into easy read or symbol-based, accessible communications
- British Sign Language interpreted messages
- Additional print or digital communications costs incurred as a result of improving accessibility

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Cheltenham Lottery

Purpose: Cheltenham Borough Council is running an online weekly lottery. All good causes supported by the lottery will benefit Cheltenham and its residents.

Who can apply: Local organisations that provide community activities or services within Cheltenham, which are of benefit to the residents of Cheltenham.

Funding: 60% of all ticket sales from the Cheltenham Lottery will be allocated to local good causes. 50% will be allocated to groups that sign-up to take part and 10% to the No Child Left Behind year of action on child poverty.

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Forest of Dean Covid-19 Safer Communities Fund

Purpose: This fund offers support to community groups, including those already active in providing Covid-related support, with measures to aid public awareness and understanding of the coronavirus-related regulations. The funding can only be used for expenditure in relation to the Covid-19 crisis. Activities supported by the grant fund include:

- Dissemination of the COVID-19 guidance
- Educational campaigns
- Engagement or tailored communications to sectors or group
- Practical activities (e.g. producing face masks)
- Purchase of equipment to enable groups to make their premises Covid secure

Who can apply: Community or voluntary groups, Registered Charities and Community Interest Companies operating in the Forest of Dean

Funding:

Constituted groups can apply for a maximum of £1,000.

Unconstituted groups can apply for a maximum of £500.

Grants for smaller amounts are actively encouraged. Decisions to award funding will be the responsibility of FVAF with agreed criteria of the Forest of Dean District Council based on the need in the locality.

Deadline: not stated. The fund is open until the current emergency need has passed.

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Forest Lottery

Purpose: Forest Lottery is a weekly lottery that raises money for good causes in the Forest of Dean. All good causes supported by the lottery will benefit the Forest of Dean and its residents.

Who can apply: Local organisations provide community activities or services within the Forest of Dean, which are of benefit to the residents of the Forest of Dean. They must be a constituted group, a registered charity or a registered community interest company.

Funding: Good causes keep 50% of all ticket sales from their dedicated webpage.

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Gloucester City Lottery

Purpose: Gloucester City Council runs an online lottery to help local voluntary and community organisations in the City raise funds. 60% of the proceeds go to the local voluntary sector and good causes, 20% towards the prize fund, and 20% for administration and VAT; the Council will not make a profit.

Who can apply: Local community organisations that operate in Gloucester city and benefit local residents.

Funding: Players choose local causes from a list of those that register. Good causes have their raised funds paid into their nominated account monthly.

How to sign up: Good causes can join at any time. Register by going to the website and clicking on the “I am a good cause” button.

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Gloucester City Recovery Fund

Purpose: The Recovery Fund from Gloucester City Council is a onetime opportunity for those who might be at risk of financial sustainability and need one off support to adapt their business to the impact of Covid-19.

What the money can be used for:

- Cover lost revenue from premises hire or cancelled fundraising activities
- IT/Technology
- Making premises Covid compliant – eg signage

- Support with adaptations to the way you work

Staff costs which create an ongoing funding commitment from the city council will not be funded.

Who can apply: Small community or voluntary groups and Community Centres

To apply Please email grants@gloucester.gov.uk detailing who you are, what you do, how much you are applying for and your project plan.

We would like you to demonstrate partnership working and include in your application how you plan your recovery coming out of lockdown to demonstrate what adaptations will be made and sustainability. We will also require some detail and evidence of the premises hire who, when, and income lost over what period. We would expect you to have exhausted all other funding opportunities both locally and nationally and would ask that you include this in your application.

Funding: up to £1,000

Deadline: applications can be made at any time. Decisions will be made on a first come first served rolling basis by a panel of officers, senior management and the cabinet member for Communities.

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Your Gloucester Small Grants

Purpose: Gloucester City Council has allocated £10,000 to support residents who are not currently involved in local community activities to develop projects using the asset based community development approach. Asset based community development enables local communities to shape and drive an activity themselves. Your activity will need to kick start or enhance community based activities to benefit groups, young people or adults in Gloucester City.

Who can apply: Constituted or un-constituted groups. Individuals must have the support of a constituted group which has agreed to be the banker for their project.

Funding: Grants are available to individuals up to £250 and for groups up to £500.

Deadline: applications can be made at any time until the funding has been spent.

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Stroud District Lucky Severn Community Lottery

Purpose: Lucky Severn Community Lottery is a weekly lottery that raises money for good causes in the Stroud District Council area.

Who can apply: Local organisations that provide community activities or services within Stroud District.

Funding: Tickets for the Lucky Severn Community Lottery cost £1 with 60p going towards local good causes.

Stroud District good causes will be able to set up their own lottery page, and will receive 50p in every pound spent by players using this method. 10p in every pound will go into a general Stroud District good causes fund, with the remainder being put towards prizes, operating costs and VAT.

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Big Lottery Fund

Purpose: Reaching Communities provide grants to help improve local communities and the lives of people most in need, including hard to reach communities. There is a small revenue and a capital scheme and a larger buildings only fund. All projects must address one or more of the following outcomes. People have better chances in life, with better access to training and development to improve their life skills; Stronger communities, with more active citizens, working together to tackle their problems; Improved rural and urban environments, which communities are better able to access and enjoy; and Healthier and more active people and communities.

Who can apply: Voluntary or community organisations

Funding: £10,001 or more, for up to five years.

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Tewkesbury Borough Council Covid-19 Emergency Community Grants

Purpose: Tewkesbury Borough Council's small grant scheme supports charitable organisations that have set up projects in response to Covid-19. Grants will be for work that directly relates to challenges emerging from the Covid-19 outbreak. The following activities are a priority:

- Direct and immediate practical support for vulnerable groups
- Volunteer capacity to organisations delivering support to the above groups
- Providing the above groups with access to necessary resources

- Initiatives to reduce isolation and vulnerability
- Initiatives to support mental wellbeing

Running costs for organisations will be supported, including staff costs, volunteer expenses and transport costs. Small capital costs are also eligible, providing the capital items are directly linked to supporting the above activities.

Who can apply: charitable organisations, voluntary and community groups. Applicants must be working with communities in Tewkesbury Borough.

Funding: The maximum grant is £1,000.

If you have already received funding through this programme, you can apply again if there is an exceptional need and your project meets the eligibility criteria. Please contact the Community Funding Officer before applying for further grants.

Deadline: applications can be made until available money has been allocated.

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The National Lottery Awards for All

Purpose: A quick way to apply for smaller amounts of funding between £300 and £10,000.

With the COVID-19 pandemic still with us, we'll continue to support people and communities most adversely impacted by COVID-19.

Who can apply: organisations supporting older people; disabled people (including people with long-term health conditions); LGBTQ+ and BAME communities. Organisations that provide advice and support to those pushed in crisis as a result of the pandemic and organisations supporting people and their families with end-of-life care.

Funding: Grants between £300 and £10,000.

Deadline: Ongoing.

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The National Lottery Reaching Communities

Purpose: This programme offers a larger amount of funding (over £10,000) for organisations that work with their community to help them thrive. It funds projects that work to make positive changes in the community – whether that is for people living in the same area, or people with similar interests or life experiences.

Who can apply: organisations supporting older people; disabled people (including people with long-term health conditions); LGBTQ+ and BAME communities. Organisations that provide advice and support to those pushed in crisis as a result of the pandemic and organisations supporting people and their families with end-of-life care.

Funding: Over £10,001.

Deadline: Ongoing.

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The National Lottery Community Fund – Partnerships Fund

Purpose: The National Lottery Partnership programme offers a larger amount of funding for organisations that work together with a shared set of goals to help their community thrive – whether that's a community living in the same area, or people with similar interests or life experiences.

The Lottery is focusing on funding projects and organisations helping communities through the COVID-19 pandemic. If you are not looking for COVID-19 related funding please do not submit an application at this time.

Who can apply: Not for profit organisations such as community organisations, charities, schools and social enterprises

Funding: over £10,000

Deadline: applications can be made at any time – but only for Covid-19 related funding.

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The National Lottery Community Fund – Bringing People Together - **NEW**

Purpose: The National Lottery Bringing People Together programme funds organisations that build stronger connections across communities, and improve the infrastructure and conditions that are needed to strengthen these connections.

The funding will enable organisations to deliver collaborative projects across at least two countries in the UK that focus on equality, diversity and inclusion, particularly amongst people of colour, disabled people, LGBTQ+ people, and asylum or refugee seekers. Applications can be made at any time.

Who can apply: Not for profit organisations such as community organisations, charities, schools and social enterprises .

Funding: up to £1,000,000.

Deadline: applications can be made at any time.

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Allotment Gardens Trust

Purpose: Grants of are available for the improvement and development of facilities on registered and permitted sites. The funding is being made available by the National Allotment Gardens Trust which aims to advance and improve the Allotments/Gardens movement through education, training, workshops and support. Non-statutory sites may also be granted funding if a long-term lease is in place.

Who can apply: registered Allotment Associations and committees across the UK.

Funding: between £250 and £2,000

Deadline: Applications will be assessed by the Board of Trustees on a quarterly basis. The deadlines for the applications are 1st Jan, 1st April, 1st July, 1st October.

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Armed Forces Covenant Fund: Force for Change – NEW

Purpose: Grants are available for community projects supporting Armed Forces communities. In particular, funding is available to support Armed Forces communities to become less isolated and engage more in their local area, and to support needs that have arisen as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Who can apply: To be eligible to apply, the applicant organisation must be an established registered charity or Community Interest Company (CIC) with substantial recent experience of supporting Armed Forces communities; an Armed Forces unit or base; a local authority; or a school.

Funding: up to £10,000.

Deadline: The closing date for applications for this funding round is noon the 30th May 2022.

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The Arnold Clark Community Fund

Purpose: The Arnold Clark Community Fund will award 500 grants through a monthly draw to help charities and community groups continue their important work which may be at risk due to the pandemic.

Who can apply: UK-registered charities and community groups

Funding: up to £1,000

Deadline: The deadline for applications is 23:59 on the 30th June 2022.

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Aviva Community Fund

Purpose: Aviva has teamed up with the fundraising platform Crowdfunder to offer funding of up to £50,000 to with innovative ideas that benefit their community. Every three months from January 2020 onwards, £250,000 will be split equally among Aviva's UK employees to donate to the projects that matter to them most. Aviva wants to support projects that boost the resilience of communities in the face of uncertainty and will be supporting projects in two key areas:

- **Climate Action:** Promoting healthy, thriving communities by preventing, preparing for and protecting against the impacts of climate change.
- **Financial Wellbeing:** Helping people to take control of their wellbeing by giving them the tools to be more financially resilient and independent.

Once applications have been submitted, applicants will need to create a fundraising page on Crowdfunder that Aviva employees can browse and donate funds to. Applicants can also showcase their projects to raise additional public donations.

Who can apply: small charities, schools and community interest groups in the UK. To take part the project must also be raising funds to develop a new approach, product or technology, pilot a new scheme, implement a new initiative, or expand existing services to a new area or beneficiary group. All beneficiaries must be in the UK.

Funding: Up to £50,000. The fund will be awarding £250,000 each quarter.

Deadline: Ongoing.

B&Q Community Reuse Scheme

Purpose: B&Q operates a community reuse scheme donating unsellable products and materials for re-use by local schools and community groups to benefit the local community and the environment. All items are donated on the understanding that they will be re-used or disposed of responsibly if they are not used. The types of material includes wood, plastic plant pots, part filled paint cans, broken tiles and slabs, end of wallpaper rolls.

B&Q also works with Community Repaint, a network of schemes that collects any surplus, re-usable paint and redistributes it within their communities to individuals and families on low income, charities and community groups.

Who can apply: Community garden projects, Registered charities, Schools and colleges, Youth groups, Scouts and Guides, Hospices, Preschool groups and registered child minders.

To access Community Repaint, charities, community groups, colleges or schools should contact B&Q. B&Q will add the organisation's details to their database and when a store has something to donate, they will use this list to get in touch with groups in their area.

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Co-op Local Community Fund - NEW

Purpose: The Co-op Local Community Fund will fund projects that provide access to essentials such as food and:

- improving people's mental wellbeing
- creating opportunities for young people to be heard and make a difference
- helping people protect local biodiversity or tackle climate change by reducing carbon emissions

Who can apply: UK registered charities, scout, guide or woodcraft folk groups, social enterprises, church or chapels that are 'excepted' charities, co-operative societies, credit unions, community benefit societies, community interest companies (CIC), and any other groups that can prove they're not run for private profit.

Funding: up to £3,000.

Deadline: To apply for funding, send your application by midnight on 29 May 2022.

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Co-operative Bank - Customer Donation Fund (UK)

Purpose: Organisations such as can apply for funding of up to £1,000 from the Customer Donation Fund.

Who can apply: Registered Charities, Community Interest Companies, Co-operatives and Credit Unions; etc. that have a Community Directplus account

Funding: up to £1,000.

Deadline: The closing dates for applications are March and September each year and they will then be assessed in April and October.

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Community Business Crowdmatch

Purpose: Power to Change has teamed up with Crowdfunder to launch Community Business Crowdmatch. The fund aims to support business providing services or activities to benefit the local community. This could include launching new business ideas to help their local neighbourhood; to help meet increased demand; save a community space; or help bridge a funding gap. Priorities include supporting marginalised communities, less affluent areas, projects led by younger people, climate crisis and digital transformation.

Who can apply: Community businesses that are providing services or activities that benefit their local community.

Funding: Power to Change will match fund up to 50% raised through crowdfunding, to a maximum of £10,000.

Deadline: Applications can be made at any time.

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Cotswold Primrose Charitable Trust

Purpose: The trust provides funds predominantly to charities whose fields of operation focus on allowing individuals to access education, training, work and sports and physical activities within the UK.

Who can apply: UK registered charities.

Funding: Undisclosed.

Deadline: Ongoing. Applications must be made in writing and applicants are expected to: -

- Understand their target area and have some experience of working in that area;
- Demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Trustees that they know exactly what they intend to do to benefit their target area and that the applicants are fully involved in the process;
- Satisfy the trustees that the target community and users have a need for and are engaged in the process;
- Monitor and analyse the outcomes.

Who can apply: Funding is available to non-profit making organisations, constituted organisations or groups within 10 miles of a landfill site operated by Enover Management Limited, or within ten miles of a waste facility managed by the company. Within Gloucestershire, these are: -

Funding: Most grants are up to £50,000 but there are no maximum or minimum grant levels given.

Ford Britain Trust

Purpose: The large grant funding will support projects which benefit local communities focusing on the advancement of education, the environment, children, those with disabilities, youth activities and local communities. Who can apply: Registered charities, not-for-profit organisations, and schools/PTAs

GEM Road Safety Charity – CLOSING SOON

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Association for Industrial Archaeology

- Small projects which are allocated at least 20% of the available funds. The grant limit is £7,500, for which the total cost of the project, excluding the value of volunteer labour, must not exceed £10,000.

Who can apply: Armed Forces charities and other organisations.

Funding: up to £30,000.

Deadline: The Grants Committee sits four times a year.
